Pupil Premium 2013-2014

<u>Introduction</u>

The Pupil and Service Premium are additional funds provided to schools to help address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers. The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM'); for children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months, and children of service personnel.

In most cases, Pupil Premium is clearly identifiable and is left to the discretion of the school to decide how best to use this funding, to help to narrow the gap for individuals. From September 2012, schools were required to publish online information describing how they have used this funding, so that parents and other stakeholders are made fully aware of how the Pupil Premium has impacted on the attainment of pupils.

What does this mean for Barrowby Church of England Primary School?

In 2013-2014, the amount of money received for the Pupil Premium continues to be very low at £9, 200.

In Early Years & Key Stage 1, we have allocated £4800 to:

 Contribute to the funding of an additional Teaching Assistant, to deliver through lessons or directed interventions, targeted support to individuals or groups, in Years R, 1 & 2, to help pupils narrow the gap between themselves and their peers in aspects of reading, phonics, writing and maths

In Key Stage 2, we have allocated £4,400 to:

- Employ an additional teacher, to provide additional support to help pupils
 narrow the gap between themselves and their peers in aspects of reading,
 writing and maths
- To purchase a range of identified resources to be used to support pupils, to

 enable them to fully access their learning
- To subsidise educational experiences and residential visits for pupils

Our aim, is that every child in this school continues to make at least good progress and that *all* fulfil their potential.

In 2013-2014, the amount of money received for the Service Premium continues to be very low at £4,000.
